WHAT IS EBOLA?


- Ebola is the cause of viral hemorrhagic fever disease.
- It spreads through bodily fluids from a person who is sick with or has died from Ebola, or from exposure to contaminated objects, such as needles.

SYMPTOMS:

- Fever, headache, joint and muscle aches, weakness, diarrhea, vomiting, stomach pain, lack of appetite and abnormal bleeding.
- May appear anywhere from 2 to 21 days after exposure to Ebola virus, though 8–10 days is most common.
